This amazing kaupapa demonstrates to tauira the importance of communication and body language which horses pick up on and enable the connection to be established.

It was awesome to be part of WhyOra Pūtaiao 2023 at Taranaki Racecourse. Hundred's of students from all the different kura across Taranaki took part in this interactive expo helping to highlight how important science is as a topic to study and how this education can assist in securing mahi in the environment. Four sessions across each day allowed the Tupu ā nuku team to share knowledge around pest control, identifying pests and trapping, along with identifying native trees and manu.



LAKE ROTOKARE

Part of our kaupapa is taking rangatahi to Lake Rotokare to really see successful pest control in operation. Tupu ā nuku are working in collaboration with Lake Rotokare to develop a volunteer programme, one day a week to engage tauira in this important mahi and be part of the team working towards Predator Free Taranaki by 2050. Volunteer work is an excellent way to start establishing a working routine and is a great way to gain experience in the field. It is also important to include any volunteer work on a CV to indicate to potential employers' dedication to working and being involved in our taiao.

With our support, Journi passed her learners license on her first attempt and is now ready to sit her restricted which gives her so much more independence. Another great achievement to celebrate. Engaging with Hōiho hāpai hapori, Journi had an awesome session with Reggie. Her smile says it all.

After overcoming a lot of personal challenges Journi embarked on a move from Taranaki to Manawatu to start a new exciting chapter. Dani and Lisa had the privilege of helping Journi make this move and assisted in her relocation. Journi has now secured mahi at Ten O'clock Cookie Bakery Café in her new home town and Monique, her manager said, "Journi has already exceeded expectations." She also mentioned how good Journi's communication skills are and how she just "gets on with it in, a calm way."

Although, hospitality was not on Journi's original career list, she has successfully secured this mahi and is fortunate enough to be able to combine her mahi with also playing rugby for the local women's team which Monique is also involved with. WHATS NEXT....

Tupu ā nuku have a number of exciting kaupapa/collaborations coming up, which include:

- Establishing the volunteer programme with Lake Rotokare and engaging rangatahi in this mahi on a weekly basis.
- Developing a 17-week programme for taiohi who are not on the Forestry and Conservation course, this is looking to commence in 2024.
- Continuing to work with schools and planning the 2024 programmes.
- Hosting Taranaki Taiohi collective at a noho marae in November 2023.
- Continuing to build further connections with local employers to enable opportunities for tauira to secure mahi.
